A Word From Our Pastor

Fallow Seasons

I grew up with a father who worked with beef cattle, which meant that spending time on farms and ranches was just a given in my upbringing...not always to my enjoyment. It doesn't take long working or being around agriculture to realize that you're not the one in control. Plants grow at the speed of the sun and the rain and the growing season. Animals,



like people, have an individuality about their development that often befuddles our attempts to command them.

That doesn't mean that we are without abilities to make a difference. That, in fact, was my father's life work, to improve the productivity of the beef cattle industry. He kept a photo in his house of a young heifer surrounded by seven or eight young calves with the inscription "Dr. Jim's dream."

He did that work well because he knew a truth about agriculture – there are productive seasons and there are fallow seasons – and the work that can be done in those periods is vastly different. In fact, my father worked extremely hard to change the fallow times – those moments when the winter's chill has set in, when the growing can't occur, when life seems more about waiting than about producing – those were the moments that my dad tried to affect

Fallow seasons also happen in the rest of life – like during a pandemic. Much of how we have defined our life in the past is on hold, and that can be a cause of frustration...or for creating a different effort.

Steve has been hard at work taking care of overlooked parts of our campus...duties he is often unable to do well because of the groups that usually take his time.

Melissa continually amazes me with the tasks she takes on...and solves!...tasks that might remain undone except for a fallow season.

In a season like the one that surrounds us, plow blades are sharpened, seeds are stored and readied, pastures are replenished with depleted nutrients, and exhausted animals are fed and prepared. All in preparation...

A group of St. Franciscans is coming together to do one of these "fallow-season" tasks and you might want to join. They are planning a to build a Zen Garden on campus. Do you have skills or knowledge that might prepare that ground?

Great Decisions 2021

Global supply chains and national security

The shutdown of global supply chains due to the Covid-19 pandemic brought to the fore an issue with the high level of global economic interdependence: what happens when one country is the main source for an item, say face masks, and then can no longer supply the item? Countries suddenly unable to meet the demand for certain supplies are faced with growing calls for economic nationalism. What are some of the lasting effects that the pandemic could have on global supply chains and trade? How would this affect national security?

Persian Gulf security issues

The Persian Gulf remains tense as the rivalry between the regional powers of Saudi Arabia and Iran continues. Tensions escalated in early 2020 as the United States began to intervene in the Gulf, launching an airstrike that killed two Iranian military commanders. What are the historical influences that have led to these tensions? What role, if any, should the United States play? Is using military force a viable foreign policy option for 2021 and beyond?

Brexit and the European Union

With the "Brexit transition period" coming to an end this year, the United Kingdom will formally leave the European Union at the start of 2021. With negotiations between the two entities continuing to stall, what does the future of Europe and the UK look like? Will the UK survive a possible Scottish vote to leave? Who will step up/ command of Europe without Angela Merkel?

Because of climate change, large sheets of arctic ice are melting, exposing vast stores of natural gas and oil. With Russia and China already miles ahead with their Arctic strategies, can the U.S. catch up?

China's role in Africa

As Chinese President Xi Jinping's centerpiece "Belt and Road initiative" continues to expand Chinese power, the response to the spread of Covid-19, as well as the African government's growing debt to China, has seen pushback. Attempts by South Korean President Moon Jae-in and U.S. President Donald Trump to repair the rift between North and South have lost any momentum as Pyongyang continues to test long-range missiles for its nuclear weapons program.
