


The Lemon Tree



It was a joyful occasion that included a celebration of the many accomplishments of the programs and operations of this wonderful community service.

Scott Blades, the executive director for TIHAN and a member of St. Francis in the Foothills, told the gathering how TIHAN began, almost 25 years ago, with an idea by a handful of St. Francis church members. The idea was to offer services and compassionate care for individuals living with HIV in the Tucson community. From meager beginnings as a committee of St. Francis church, the organization is now an independent non-profit supported by 30-plus churches and faith organizations, over a dozen local businesses that offer financial and in-kind support, and more than 100 volunteers.

The evening's program included recognition of individuals and teams for their "Outstanding Efforts in 2018!" St. Francis in the Foothills members receiving special recognition were **Noel Floresca** and **Jon Stetson**, long-term volunteers, board members and recipients for "Excellence in Caring"; **Ron Holland** for many services from administrative tasks to outstanding CareParter support; **Karen Sparks** (who is St. Francis' TIHAN representative) for outstanding CarePartner support and Education and Awareness service; and **John Wilson** for outstanding Link Specialist, Care Team, and New Volunteer services.

And, of course, **St. Francis in the Foothills** was thanked for providing their facilities and staff monthly through the year to host Poz Cafe, where up to 160 persons living with HIV come for a sumptuous lunch prepared by a consortium of churches and faith organizations, an auction, games, and camaraderie.

Grateful thanks to everyone who help make TIHAN the amazing organization it is.
