Hummingbirds came and went as Mary and I watched them feeding. We noticed one perched but motionless, its long beak pointed straight up. About every five minutes it lowered its beak into the feeder but didn't seem to be drinking.

Afraid he couldn't get water, I filled a rubber squeeze bulb with sugar water and pressed the water drop at the end of the bulb into the tip of his beak. I did this several times. Perched only inches away, the hummingbird seemed unaware of me.

The bird's chest rose and fell, his beak opened and closed as his tongue went in and out, yet he seemed unable to drink. I watched him become less and less able to remain upright, at times nearly falling off the perch, only to quickly recover his strength and balance.

Slowly he collapsed on the feeder shelf . . .head resting on the perch bar. His eyes gradually opened less and less and then remained closed.

One and a half hours had passed since we first noticed him and now the only motion was the rhythmic in and out of the rust speckled breast. A great sadness and sense of loss passed over me. I recalled my family at my dying mother's bedside singing "If You Get to Heaven Before I Do." I was told that hearing is the last to go. So I began to whistle softly and hum, my mouth inches away from my little friend. I thought perhaps this would ease his passing and my sadness.

About five minutes after I began whistling and humming, the right eye blinked. One blink was followed by several more until the eye stayed open. The needle-thin tongue, hanging lifeless out of the long beak suddenly disappeared. The beak that had barely opened a crack opened wider and more frequently in rhythm with the rising and falling of his chest. The head came up off the perch, the right wing twitched and opened. The tail feathers opened and closed a few times. All within two or three minutes. Then suddenly he flew . . . inches from my startled face . . .and I watched as my winged friend darted off to alight on a small Palo Verde branch about 30 feet away.
