The team got together on two Saturday mornings to decorate 108 Care Package bags for TIHAN's Poz Cafe gift-giving this holiday season.



A Word from Our Pastor

How Is Spirit Calling?

I wonder how many others are starting their January newsletter with some variation of, "Glad we made it through 2020"? The intersection of pandemics, elections, racial unrest, social disorder and economic uncertainty gives a much broader and deeper meaning to the word "crash." And those incidences throughout the year have often been deadly.

Due to those collisions, as much as it is an accomplishment to have survived the year, the work that this moment brings to us is far from over. Because vaccines are being provided, it doesn't mean our diligence to health and relationship can stop. Because we may feel more at ease than we have for months does not mean that others can or do share that comfort. Because an election is finished doesn't stop the work of governance and reconciliation that this New Year will ask of us.

We have tasks ahead of us. I saw a meme that explained it well for me -



It is certainly much easier to act like the woman on the left – hoping that someone else will do the work that must be done.

Because the need for food was so great, St. Francis was going to re-open its Food Pantry for one morning a week, hoping to help. To do this, we needed donations to fill our shelves - especially holiday foods.

All folks had to do was drive up to the Celebration Center on this particular Wednesday morning between 9:00 and 11:00 am, and we would unload their donations. Plus they could pick up a new church directory (It only took nine months to get them.)!

That Wednesday, members of the St. Francis Care Team showed up ready to go. They chatted and paced, enjoying the cool weather. Melissa sat behind a table, poised to hand out new directories. They could hear traffic passing by on Swan Road. They chatted some more . . .


Then cars began to come - two and three at a time. They stopped at the first table to give their accumulated change to Katie Kans. Then they drove up to the front of the Celebration Center where the volunteers unloaded their cars. There was talk and laughter as folks dropped off their bags and boxes and picked up the new directories. Pastor Jim greeted people, visited and carried in food.

When the Food Drive was done, the lobby of the Celebration Center had bags lined up three rows deep! It took two pickup truck loads to get it all down to the church office where the Library for Peace became an impromptu holding area. Tables were put up and bags and boxes were loaded onto them.





It was an absolutely amazing sight-six tables full and more stuff underneath! Even now, going into January, the library is still full of food items, waiting to be stocked in the pantry and given away. And we have you to thank for it. You are so amazing!
