A Word from Our Pastor

Christmas Miracles

I hope you've been thinking about the Christmas Miracle Challenge I gave to you. There is so much need all around us and so many ways that we can help.



Our tendencies to give to those who already have plenty can blind us to the amazing ways we can change lives with just a small change in habit.

One estimate I saw said that the average American household in 2018 spent \$1,536 on Christmas.

How many pairs of pajamas could we buy if we spent 10% less on each other and gave that amount to the Angel Heart Pajama Project?

If we shifted 25% of that total, how would that \$384 help feed homeless families trying to get back on their feet?

Even if we gave away half of that total to help others around us, isn't \$768 still a tidy sum to give to one another?

And if you don't spend any money on gifts for others, there is still opportunities to be a miracle. *The Soul Box Project* allows us to add to a growing movement in America to stop gun violence and increase community connection. And speaking of connection. . . .

Yesterday a group of "representatives" from the



International School for Peace came to the church office with a gift. One by one these three and four-year-old children brought in cans of vegetables, boxes of cereal, and bottles of spaghetti sauce until our kitchen table was overflowing with their love.

And we needed it...because close to 15 bags of food went out that same morning.

As a faith-based community, St. Francis in the Foothills:

- Pledges to continue to celebrate the covenant of straight and same-gender weddings in our church, and our pastors will continue to conduct these weddings with the full, loving support of our faith community.
- Proclaims that <u>all</u> persons should be free to be ordained, appointed and serve their congregations without fear of trial for who they love or who God created them to be.

We still aren't sure what the institutional future of St. Francis will be; or, what formal - or informal - relationship our church will have to the broader United Methodist church. But we know what is in our hearts and minds: <u>our values</u>, <u>principles and commitments</u> will not change.

In 1914, World War I, the bloodiest war ever at that time in human history was well under way. However, on Christmas Eve, numerous sections of the Western Front called an informal and unauthorized truce where the various front-line soldiers of the conflict peacefully met each other in No Man's Land to share a precious pause in the carnage with a fleeting brotherhood.

This film dramatizes one such section as the French, Scottish and German sides partake in the unique event, even though they are aware that their superiors will not tolerate its occurrence.

A Story St. Francis Can Be Proud Of by Art Aldag

About ten years ago, we welcomed a new member to St. Francis in the Foothills who had just received his US citizenship, was working on his undergraduate degree at the University of Arizona and was passionate about providing help for his native homeland. John Akuar was one of Sudan's "Lost Boys", and their story has been the topic of over a dozen documentaries. John believed strongly that education, particularly for the young girls, was the path forward for Sudan. This passion was contagious, and John soon had St. Francis actively working to bring his vision to reality. And we did it!

The St. Francis community funded the construction of a school with 8 classrooms and had 5 water wells installed in his village of Abul. Several of us from St. Francis went and visited John's village as South Sudan won its independence and became the newest country in the world. The school is up and running and I even brought home a bottle of water from the new well, which I still have in my refrigerator. You can see a video of the visit put together by Rolly Loomis at:

Heifer for the Holidays!



Heifer Project International works all over the world, including the US, giving families livestock and the training to make sure they thrive. The livestock are not for direct consumption. Angora rabbits give wool, goats give milk, water buffalo plow fields. In southeastern Asia, flocks of ducks or geese lay eggs. The eggs or milk can be consumed by the family to raise their level of nutrition, or sold for funds for medicine or school fees.

Heifer works hard to make sure families have the knowledge to succeed, allowing the gift to become self-sustaining as well as shared with others.

In December, on the four Sundays before Christmas, we will have a table set up outside the center with literature and information.

Heifer offers unique gift giving: whole llamas or shares of sheep, and we have cards to go with your gift. Please stop by and check us out.

South Sudan has had a difficult birthing experience with tribal conflict for government control the predominant feature of their first years of independence. The school was closed for a while, but as of February of 2019 it is back functioning. When John was here at St. Francis this past June, he talked about the status of the project and expressed, on behalf of the Abul community, their appreciation for the support provided by St. Francis.

There is one area of concern and I am appealing for support from our St. Francis community. As John noted during his visit, the government is not financially supporting the teachers. John felt that if we could provide each teacher \$100/mo., that would be incentive enough to attract some good, qualified teachers for the Abul School. Currently there are 6 teachers providing their time gratis. A salary of \$100/mo. would go a long way in John's village of Abul.

To help with this, St. Francis has established a fund for the Abul School which would allow us to transfer money monthly to the KCB Bank in Wau, South Sudan, a major city close to John's village. Several St. Francis members have already responded and set up a transfer of \$100/mo. and I invite others who share in my enthusiasm to help John fulfill his vision. 
